Message from - the Chair and the Chief Executive

As many of you will know the government consulted on the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act 2003 (the Act) during 2025. At this time, we've been advised that changes to the Act are being drafted although there's no definitive timeframe for this to be moved to the next stage. When this does occur, the Board will make written submissions and will consider whether it will also make submissions in person to the Select Committee. The Board has taken the opportunity to once again raise for consideration the matter of the proposed name change for the Board so that it better reflects the profession it regulates.

Whether you're a member of the public, a registered practitioner, or an employer, we encourage you to get in touch if you have any questions or concerns about a practitioner's competence, fitness to practise, or conduct.

What is secondary legislation?

This is law developed by a person or organisation that has the delegated authority from Parliament to create it. The Board has the power to develop secondary legislation, such as defining the scope of practice, and the Code of Ethical Conduct.



Child protection education

Health practitioners play an important role in identifying and raising concerns about possible signs of child harm, abuse, or neglect. Indeed, they may often be the first person to notice signs.

The health system also has an important role in the detection and reporting of abuse. It's vital, therefore, that health practitioners who work with children have the knowledge and skills to make sure they're aware of possible signs and can take the necessary steps when they have concerns.

Education to support this work is essential and the Board encourages all health practitioners to engage in child protection education to support efforts to keep children safe. Guidance is provided on the Te Whatu Ora website Family violence and sexual violence – Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora

Annual practising certificate renewals 2026

Be prepared for renewals

Just a reminder about Annual Practising Certificate (APC) details:

- Registered practitioners must hold a current annual APC to practise as a medical imaging or radiation therapist in Aotearoa New Zealand.
- The practising year runs from 1 April to 31 March the following year.
- Details about APCs, including FAQs, forms, and documents on how to apply, the practitioner privacy statement, and the practising certificate policy are on the website here.

Bulk billing update

Some employers pay APCs for their staff using bulk funding. While we have offered this payment option before, we regret to advise it won't be available for the 2026 renewal period. We are looking into whether we can bring it back in the future.

We have a new system

In June this year we went live with our new practitioner management system. When you log in for the first time, you'll need to reset your password. Use the same email address you used in the old system.

Earlier this year we randomly selected and audited a number of practitioners as part of the bi-annual recertification programme. You can read more about this on the website here.

Keeping up to date

Doing activities to keep learning and recording what you've done helps you to keep growing in your career. The Board is also required to assure itself that practitioners continue to practise safely, effectively, and legally within the scope of practice, as it evolves.

It's always a good reminder, before practitioners are called for the audit, to find out what's required on the website here (declarations, filling in a logbook, providing evidence and reflective statements, how to submit documents for audit, resources, FAQs).

It's worth keeping a record as you go so you're not scrambling to try and remember when it comes to report on this later.
